

A whirlwind triple-threat of fiddle-driven music, dance and vocals augmented by keyboards and percussion, Leahy is a powerhouse of eight musical brothers and sisters who delight and stupefy audiences whenever they perform. Known for their unique blend of musical styles and genres, Leahy combines the influence of their Irish and Scottish roots with a rare level of energy, originality and musicianship.

The band's three acclaimed CDs – Leahy, Lakefield and In All Things – have garnered significant critical acclaim, several awards, worldwide sales of over half a million copies and touring success throughout Canada, the United States and Europe.

Founded in 1932, the Charlotte

Symphony Orchestra has grown into one of the premier musical institutions in the Southeast, giving some 100 performances each season and reaching an annual attendance of over 250,000 listeners. Throughout its history the orchestra has collaborated with the world's leading soloists, including Andrés Segovia, Alicia de Larrocha, Luciano Pavarotti, Isaac Stern, André Watts, Itzhak Perlman, Emanuel Ax and Yo-Yo Ma, among many others. Today, the Charlotte Symphony is the largest and most active professional performing arts organization in the central Carolinas. Committed to expanding the orchestral repertoire through commissioning, the Charlotte Symphony has offered the world premières of more than 30 compositions.

Led by crowd-pleasing conductor Albert-George Schram, the Charlotte Symphony's Italian-themed performance on June 30 is entitled *That's Amore!*, and takes the audience on a journey through sweeping symphonic scores by popular composers.

This concert is the Charlotte Symphony's second appearance at An Appalachian Summer Festival and third appearance at the university. The symphony last performed at the festival in 2008, when they played to a spellbound audience.

This multiple award-winning film tells the story of an Egyptian police band that gets lost on the way to play at an initiation ceremony at the Arab Cultural Center in Israel. When they are left stranded at the airport, the band tries to make their way on their own – only to find themselves in the heart of the Israeli desert. A fascinating crosscultural exploration that begins with a lost band in a lost town.



The Underground Orchestra THURSDAY | JULY 9

A glorious documentary profile of musicians who play on the sidewalks and in the Metro of Paris. Awardwinning filmmaker Heddy Honigmann illuminates the lives and music of a ragtag group of musicians united by political repression and the boundless courage that led them to find refuge in Paris. Music becomes their economic lifeline, and a shining metaphor for their will to survive.



Patagonia's Wild and Scenic Environmental Film Festival FRIDAY | JULY 10

A festival of films by activists for activists, Patagonia's Wild and Scenic Film Festival was born from an effort to save the Yuba Watershed in California, The South Yuba River Citizens' League (SYRCL) banded together to protect their river, and succeeded in having it permanently protected as a Wild and Scenic resource. Energized by their success, they created this environmental film festival to inspire and encourage local activism throughout the country. This evening, 11 short films ranging from two to 29 minutes in length will include documentaries revealing the impact of industry, touching stories of unlikely relationships born from a common cause and stunningly beautiful cinematography all of which will inspire your inner environmentalist. An Appalachian Summer Festival is pleased to welcome the return of Patagonia's Wild and Scenic Film Festival, which first delighted and inspired festival audiences in 2008.



Vitus MONDAY | JULY 13

8PM | DRAGONFLY THEATER & PUB (2006) Rated PG; Subtitled; Running Time: 2 hrs. 3 min.

Winner of the Best Swiss Film Award (2006), this film is the tale of Vitus, a five-year-old pianist with hearing like a bat who studies encyclopedias. His parents anticipate a brilliant future for him as a concert pianist, but the child prodigy prefers to play in his eccentric grandfather's workshop. He dreams of flying and of a normal childhood. Ultimately, with one dramatic leap, Vitus takes control of his own life.

The Passing of the Torch SUNDAY | JUNE 28

The compositions of Robert Schumann, one of the Romantic era's most celebrated and tragic figures, inspired generations of composers long after his death. A close friend and ardent admirer of both Schumann and his wife Clara, Johannes Brahms inherited the torch of Romanticism and held it until the end of the century when it passed to Brahms' devotee and protégé Antonín Dvořák. The ensemble will perform Schumann's Piano Quintet, Brahms' Rhapsody in g minor and Dvořák's Terzetto.

1795 – 1825: What a Difference 30 Years Makes **WEDNESDAY** | **JULY 1**

The ensemble explores the evolution of strings and piano in chamber music by three great German composers. From Haydn's Gypsy Rondo String Trio (1795), to Beethoven's String Trio in G Major (1798), to Mendelssohn's Piano Quartet No. 3 (1824), this concert will highlight the rapid and groundbreaking compositional changes that took place over a mere 30 year period.

Falling Bodies MONDAY | JULY 6

Co-commissioned by An Appalachian Summer Festival and Nine Circles Chamber Theatre in celebration of the festival's 25th anniversary, Falling Bodies integrates actors and musicians in an imagined meeting between the 17th-century "father of modern science," Galileo Galilei, and the 20th-century author of Survival at

Auschwitz, Primo Levi. First seen during the 2008 festival, it returns after a maturing process that included more workshops and sold-out performances in the US and Italy. Written and directed by Jonathan Levi; music by Bruce Saylor.

Changing Keys WEDNESDAY | JULY 15

8PM | ROSEN CONCERT HALL

Ten years ago, Canadian artist Elma Johnston McKay began to craft a set of keys inspired by paintings and stories. Accompanied by images of McKay's Keys, Gil Morgenstern and Donald Berman weave a musical program of Beethoven, Schumann, Cage and Gershwin with readings of texts from the parables of Kafka, the diaries of Casanova and the dinner-table anecdotes of Isaiah Berlin. Music, words and image combine to reflect on the ancient symbolism of keys as agents of transition. Texts arranged by Jonathan Levi.

A reunion concert featuring flute trios by Haydn and Carl Maria von Weber, as well as Brahms' timeless masterpiece, the *Piano Quintet in f minor*. Grammy Award-winning artist Melissa Manchester's smooth, sultry voice and compelling songwriting talent has entertained sold-out audiences across the country for four decades.

Discovered by Bette Midler while performing in Greenwich Village, she joined Midler as a backup singer, and six months later headlined at Carnegie Hall.

Manchester's debut releases Home To Myself and Bright Eyes positioned her as a dynamic new talent, and Melissa launched the smash hit single Midnight Blue. With Kenny Loggins, she co-wrote the radio classic Whenever I Call You Friend, and her songs have been recorded by Barbra Streisand, Dusty Springfield, Alison Krauss, Roberta Flack and Johnny Mathis, among many others. Her songs Through The Eyes Of Love and Don't Cry Out Loud became international hits.

The recipient of numerous awards and accolades, including two Grammy nominations, a Grammy Award and two Oscar-nominated movie themes, Manchester has written and starred in many musicals. She composed for Disney's The Great Mouse Detective and co-wrote the score for Lady And The Tramp II. In 2004, she released her sixteenth CD, When I Look Down That Road.

Steven Siegel: Wonderful Life

In honor of the 25th anniversary of An Appalachian Summer Festival, The Turchin Center is proud to première this new body of work by artist Steven Siegel. Beginning in October, the exhibition will travel nationally through 2010. Siegel will return to campus for a residency in September to work with students from the departments of Art and Biology.

Steven Siegel lives and works in upstate New York. He received his MFA from Pratt Institute, and an MA and BA from Hampshire College in Amherst.

The recipient of numerous grants and awards, he has completed sculptures and installations in the US and abroad. In 1998, Siegel won the 12th Rosen Outdoor Sculpture Competition and Exhibition Award for his site-specific work Squeeze 2.

Siegel spent six years creating this series of 52 pieces, which he describes as having "accidental inception." He named the body of work Wonderful Life, the title of a 1989 publication by evolutionary biologist Steven Jay Gould, who studied fossil records in British Columbia and determined that chance played a large part in survival of species. Siegel says, "Evolutionary biology has rich parallels to the creative process and the development of craft. This series... is about the simple, cumulative changes that generate form, from generation to generation."

Harlan Toole: Recent Work JULY 3 - OCTOBER 3

An alumna of Appalachian State University's Department of Art, Harlan Toole received her BFA in 2007.

The artist's childhood in Alabama and her relationship with water shapes her work. Her paintings are representational, inspired by her memories of – and her emotional connection to – water. Her work considers the scientific relationships among water, color and sound, and further explores connections between humans and the ocean. The

artist states, "The human body is composed mostly of water and our blood's saline content is nearly identical to that of the ocean. The body also contains DNA identical to the very first living organism – blue-green algae – which is found in the ocean. Water interests me because of the qualities it possesses. It clarifies sound and refracts and distorts objects and color with light and depth. This instills in me a profound tranquility."

Faculty Selects is an annual exhibition of student work sponsored by The Furniture Society, an international, non-profit organization based in nearby Asheville, and presented in conjunction with The Furniture Society's 2009 annual conference. Jurors for the 2009 exhibition are Tom Loeser, who heads the Furniture Design program at the University of Wisconsin, Madison; student and Furniture Society board member Chris Schwab and Alan Harp, Director of Georgia Tech's Advanced Wood Products Laboratory.

Western North Carolina's High Country is home to the furniture industry and the traditional craft. The area supports well over 100 manufacturing plants in the region, numerous national furniture brands and many schools and organizations dedicated to the art and craft of furniture making, including the Furniture Society, which holds as its mission to advance the art of furniture making by inspiring creativity, promoting excellence and fostering an understanding of the art and its place in society.

Appalachian State University has taught Furniture Studies for over 100 years. Originally established to help provide a labor force, the newly formed Furniture Design concentration has adapted to the many changes that have affected the furniture industry. In hosting The Furniture Society's conference, Appalachian bridges the craft and the industry of North Carolina's rich furniture history and celebrates a new future.

Sculptor Gillian Christy holds a BFA from the University of Northern Iowa. She has created commercial graphics for the NFL on CBS, as well as works for NBC's The Apprentice, NBC Sports' Gravity Games and HBO. Christy has exhibited her work in numerous outdoor collections, museums and galleries.

Christy's sculpture focuses on ideas and related images of home. Her work is influenced by the surrounding environment. The artist states, "Images of home first appeared in my early work in which I was taken by the architecture of mid-western Iowa. Presently, I am living in an urban neighborhood filled with architecture and industrial elements such as mills,

vents, and rooftops that are new and different." By combining these forms in her sculpture, she continues to find new and refreshing images of home, incorporating details into her work that tell a highly illustrative story.

PILOBOLUS

Pilobolus began in 1971 as an outsider dance company, and quickly became renowned the world over for its imaginative and athletic exploration of creative collaboration. Nearly 40 years later, it has evolved into a pioneering American cultural institution of the 21st century.

The company continues to grow, expanding and refining its unusual collaborative methods to produce a body of over 100 choreographic works, and while it has become a genre unto itself in the world of American dance theater, Pilobolus remains as innovative and influential as ever. The physical vocabularies of Pilobolus' works are not drawn from traditions of codified dance movement, but are invented, emerging from intense periods of improvisation and creative play.


Pilobolus has been featured, with great popularity, on broadcast media: in 2004, CBS' 60 Minutes; in 2007, the Academy Awards hosted by Ellen Degeneres, and shortly thereafter, The Oprah Winfrey Show; and most recently on Late Night with Conan O'Brien.

Pilobolus Dance Theatre last performed at An Appalachian Summer Festival in 2006, when a sold-out crowd received the company's performance with thunderous applause and a standing ovation.

Four-time Grammy nominee Buckwheat Zydeco conveys the essence of zydeco music as seen through the prism of rock, soul and jazz.

Hailing from Lafayette, Louisiana, Stanley "Buckwheat" Dural Jr. describes his hometown "a close-knit community where many black people express their Creole heritage by speaking French, and by playing and dancing to zydeco." This hybrid genre blends Afro-Caribbean rhythms with blues, soul, rock, country and the French-rooted Cajun music of the Creoles' white neighbors. The son of a zydeco accordionist,

Buckwheat grew up steeped in this culture, absorbing Lafayette's prodigious output of blues and Gulf Coast "swamp pop."

His stellar career spans decades of critical acclaim, and he has headlined major venues; collaborated with a who's who of musicians from Eric Clapton to Mavis Staples, and made numerous television appearances, including The Late Show with David Letterman and NBC's Today show. His latest release, Jackpot, was well received by critics and fans alike.

Buckwheat Zydeco last played at An Appalachian Summer Festival in 2006, energizing the crowd and thrilling audience members of all ages.

Sophie B. Hawkins emerged in 1992 with her debut album, Tongues and Tails, which quickly went gold, earned her a Grammy nomination for Best New Artist, and fired her hit single Damn I Wish I Was Your Lover into Billboard's Top Five. Another gold album, Whaler, followed two years later along with the single, As I Lay Me Down, which stayed on the Billboard charts for a record-breaking 67 weeks. Within a few years, she had won universal respect for her rare blend of gutsy honesty.

Hawkins studied at the Manhattan School of Music, and with African drum legend Babatunde Olatuni. The exotic percussion style that she developed during this time has fascinated her since, as evidenced by her 2004 album *Wilderness*.

In August 2006, she released her debut live album, the *Bad Kitty Board Mix*, a two-disc set that captures her true energy and essence as a performer.

Serena rises to the challenges of the camp, but the Pembertons' marriage is tumultuous. Serena discovers that George is the father of an illegitimate child, and when she learns that she cannot bear children, she seeks revenge on the child. This gripping story is Macbeth via Appalachia.

Rash currently serves as the Parris Distinguished Professor in Appalachian Cultural Studies at Western Carolina University in Cullowhee. He was born in 1953 in Chester, South Carolina, and grew up in Boiling Springs, North Carolina. He has family roots locally in the Aho Community.

The Carol Grotnes Belk Distinguished Lecture celebrates its 10th anniversary in 2009. An Appalachian Summer Festival has featured the Belk Lecture each year since 2000, when Dr. Harold Keiner gave the inaugural presentation.






Some guys have all the luck.

Joan Baez is a musical force of nature whose influence is incalculable. At a time in our country's history when it was neither safe nor fashionable, she sang about freedom and Civil Rights from the backs of flatbed trucks in Mississippi to the steps of the Lincoln Memorial at Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King's March on Washington.

Her earliest recordings fed a host of traditional ballads into the rock vernacular – House of the Rising Sun (the Animals), Babe, I'm Gonna Leave You (Led Zepplin), Jackaroe (Grateful Dead), and Long Black Veil (the Band), to name a few. In 1963, she began touring and recording with Bob Dylan – a bond that came to symbolize the folk music movement. After eight gold albums and six Grammy nominations, she received the highly prestigious Lifetime Achievement Award in 2007, at the 49th Annual Grammy Awards. Just last year she stood alongside Nelson Mandela when the world celebrated his 90th birthday in London's Hyde Park.

Joan Baez continues to show renewed vitality and passion in her concerts and recordings with her mix of traditional ballads, blues, lullabies, cowboy tunes, Woody Guthrie songs and ethnic folk staples. Over the past five decades, during crucial moments in America's history, Baez's albums have served as critical barometers of our times.

This is Joan Baez's first appearance at Appalachian State University.

In 1986, the Rosen Outdoor Sculpture Competition and Exhibition became the first visual arts exhibition presented by the festival. Since that time, it has grown to become a significant component of the programming and educational outreach for visual arts on campus, which provides numerous opportunities for Appalachian students to work and interact with the Rosen artists, and become involved in the process of creating exhibition materials for and installing an outdoor sculpture exhibition.

Serving as this year's juror is Daniel E. Stetson, Executive Director of the Polk Museum of Art in Lakeland, Florida, who will announce the 2009 competition winner on July 25 after the sculpture tour.

The 23rd Rosen Outdoor Sculpture Competition and Exhibition is on display through February 2010.


