



Rucker first achieved multi-platinum status in the music industry as lead singer and rhythm guitarist of the Grammy Award-winning band Hootie & the Blowfish, who have sold more than 25 million albums worldwide including their double diamond-certified (21x platinum) debut. Cracked Rear View, which remains among the top 10 best-selling studio albums of all time. Since releasing his first country album in 2008, Rucker has earned a whole new legion of fans with four No. 1 albums on the Billboard country chart, including RIAA platinum-certified Learn to Live and True Believers. plus 10 No. 1 singles at country radio and 11 gold, platinum or multi-platinum certified hits. Rucker was inducted as a Grand Ole Opry member in 2012, and in 2014 he won his third career Grammy Award for Best Solo Country Performance with his diamond-certified (11x Platinum) version of "Wagon Wheel," one of the top five best-selling country songs of all time. He cohosted the 54th annual CMA Awards in 2020 and topped the charts at country radio once again with "Beers and Sunshine" in 2021. New songs "Same Beer Different Problem" and "Ol' Church Hymn" (featuring Chapel Hart) are available everywhere now as Rucker puts the finishing touches on his forthcoming album, Carolyn's Boy.



Named "one of the most exciting and talented young artists in country music" (Forbes), Lindsay Ell is a triple threat: musician, vocalist and songwriter. A 2023 Canadian Screen Award nominee (Best Host or Presenter, Factual or Reality/Competition), Ell is Gold-certified with two #1 Canadian singles, a U.S. #1, and has shared the stage with Shania Twain, Blake Shelton and Keith Urban, among others.


# NANCY TAFEEN GLOBAL FILM SERIES

Halim and Mina run a traditional caftan store in one of Morocco's oldest medinas. In order to keep up with the commands of the demanding customers, they hire Youssef. The talented apprentice shows an utmost dedication in learning the art of embroidery and tailoring from Halim. Slowly Mina realizes how much her husband is moved by the presence of the young man.

BASED ON THE TRUE STORY OF AURORA MARDIGANIAN
At only 14 years old, Aurora lost everything during the horror of
the Armenian genocide. Two years later, through luck and
extraordinary courage, she escaped to New York, where her
story became a media sensation. Starring as herself in Auction of
Souls, an early Hollywood blockbuster, Aurora became the face
of one of the largest charity campaigns in American history. With
a blend of vivid animation, interviews with Aurora herself, and
18 minutes of surviving footage from her lost silent epic,
Aurora's Sunrise revives a forgotten story of survival.

#### Alcarràs

In the small village of Alcarràs in Catalonia, the peach farmers of the Solé family spend every summer together picking fruit from their orchard. But when new plans arise to install solar panels and cut down trees, the members of this tight-knit group suddenly face eviction — and the loss of far more than their home.

Winner of the Golden Bear at Berlinale, the sophomore film from Carla Simón (Summer 1993) is a sun-dappled, deeply moving ensemble portrait of the countryside and a community's unbreakable bonds.



In Finnish/French with English subtitles Finland, unrated, directed by Alli Haapasalo, 2022, romance, 100 minutes

Best friends Mimmi and Rönkkö have each other's backs, always. They want to live adventurous lives, loaded with experiences and passion. Emma, on the contrary, has given her whole life to figure skating. Nothing gets between her and success. But when the girls meet, life opens new paths, and they all rocket in new directions. While Mimmi and Emma experience the earth moving effects of first love, Rönkkö is on a quest to find pleasure.

# Apollo's Fire: The Road to Dublin

Grammy winners Apollo's Fire and Jeannette Sorrell are known for exploring the crossroads of history and tradition with "infectious energy" and "profoundly spontaneous performances" (*Gramophone*]. Playing on historical instruments, the ensemble traces the roots of Appalachian music to the Irish and Scottish immigrants who crossed the Atlantic, bringing their ballads, jigs, and reels with them. Apollo's Fire has performed at Carnegie Hall, the BBC Proms, and major stages around the world — including concerts of ancient Celtic music at the Irish National Concert Hall in Dublin. Irish singer Fiona Gillespie joins the merry instrumentalists on fiddles, flute, cello, hammered dulcimer, plucked instruments, and harpsichord.

# Calidore String Quartet

The Calidore String Quartet is renowned for its "deep reserves of virtuosity and irrepressible dramatic instinct" (The New York Times). The Los Angeles Times described the musicians as "astonishing," their playing "shockingly deep," approaching "the kind of sublimity other quartets spend a lifetime searching." The Washington Post noted that "four more individual musicians are unimaginable, yet these speak, breathe, think and feel as one."

For more than a decade, the Calidore has enjoyed performances and residencies in the world's major venues and festivals, released multiple critically acclaimed recordings and won numerous awards. The Calidore is recognized as one of the world's foremost interpreters of a vast repertory; from the cycles of quartets by Beethoven and Mendelssohn to works of celebrated contemporary voices like Grygory Kurtag, Jörg Widmann and Caroline Shaw.

The festival proudly presents the 12th Annual Rosen-Schaffel Concerto Competition for Young & Emerging Artists. This year's competition extended eligibility to undergraduate and graduate collegiate musicians (up to age 26) in North Carolina, South Carolina, Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana and Florida. In the final live round of the competition, a panel of distinguished conductors will choose a First, Second, and Third Place winner from a group of finalists selected via a blind adjudication process by esteemed musicians and collegiate educators this past spring. The competition's audience will also select an Audience Choice Award winner.

Last year's competition winner, Winfred Felton (bassoon, picture above), will perform with the Eastern Festival Orchestra on July 9 (see page 16).

This performance and other classical music events at An Appalachian Summer Festival are supported by the Rosen-Schaffel Endowment for Classical Music Programing. 

Hayes School of Music Dean, Dr. James Douthit, hosts a panel featuring past winners of this remarkable competition program that has played a pivotal role in launching the careers of young artists pursuing careers in classical music. The competition celebrates its 12th season this summer, serving as a major point of pride for An Appalachian Summer Festival.

#### JULY 6 | Turchin Center Exhibition Profile: Passage/Time Pieces Moderated by Senior Curator Mary Anne Redding, with Michael Harrison and Nina Elder

Passage/Time Pieces consists of an installation by Nina Elder and an installation of original music by Michael Harrison in collaboration with musicians Elliot Cole, Ina Filip and Benoit Rolland, with lighting by Nina Elder. Passage creates a multisensory holographic effect through a constellation of tones which accentuate the audience's movement through sonic and visual space. The drawings in Time Pieces are Nina Elder's contemplations on the physical texture of time and the potential for transformation. 


